3. Student Status

International students at Doshisha University are divided into two categories, Regular Students and Special Students.

[Regular Students]

Regular Students are those who are expected to complete the designated graduate curricula of the university.

[Special Students]

Special Students are those who either enroll to fulfill requirements for particular courses in master's programs, or those who seek a professor for directed research in doctoral programs.

The following points must be kept in consideration:

- · Students are admitted in April in principle.
- **Graduate School of Life and Medical Sciences (Master's Program and Doctoral Program) and Graduate School of Global Studies (Doctoral Program) accepts Special Students in April and September.
- · Duration of studying at Doshisha University is up to one year in principle.
- $\cdot\,$ Student will have a professor as his/her academic advisor.
 - Students are allowed to earn up to 20 credits per year in principle.
- · Some of credits earned as a Special Student may be transferred when becoming a Regular Student.
- · Certificates for completing the courses may be issued.
- * General Applicants and Internal Applicants may have a chance to enroll as a Special Student if they are not accepted as a Regular Student.
- * Special considerations may be made for those who wish to apply for a status of Special Students with the selection process not complying with this Admissions Guide. Please refer to 'Other Important Information (page 296)' for details.
- * Qualifications for Applicants, Application Period, Application Procedures and Initial Registration Procedures are, unless otherwise specified, applied to Special Students as well as to Regular Students.
- * Special students are accepted if the following list indicates "O".
